

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



We proudly present to you our annual report for the year 2000. It was a remarkable year by any measure. Not only did the foundation break a record in terms of its fundraising goals, but we also exceeded in terms of services and programs. Here in America, the generosity of the public was overwhelming. Our staff had to work in shifts, early in the morning till late at night, just to keep up with the outpouring support.

What's truly amazing is the fact that we excelled under incredibly difficult situations.

The foundation was in the middle of reorganization in the West Bank and Gaza when the Palestinian uprising took us all by surprise. However, with the dedication and expertise of our staff, we were able to quickly start providing emergency relief within days. We were able to carry out a myriad of activities, from purchasing ambulances to sheltering thousands of displaced men, women and children. However, the foundation's overall work can not be measured by how much money we spent, rather by how many desperate lives we've saved and touched.

At the foundation, we value human life and cherish peace. Everything we do, from feeding children to building hospitals, adds value to human life and improves prospects for peace. We believe that the foundation can give the world what it needs the most in these troubled times: human kindness to humankind.

The Holy Land Foundation for Relief and Development maintains its belief that every man, woman, and child has the right to live in dignity and security despite obstacles that man-made and natural disasters present. In fiscal year 2000, the foundation implemented programs in crisis areas that included Chechnya, Jordan, Kosovo, Lebanon, Turkey and where our primary work remains ongoing in the West Bank and Gaza.

The year ended with tremendous sorrow as we witnessed the pain in Palestine, unable to comprehend the haunting scene of a defenseless father attempting to shield his son, Muhammed al-Durrah, from a rain of bullets. The image of human life destroyed for no apparent reason gripped the consciousness of people across the globe and inspired the foundation's donor base with an outpouring of generosity unsurpassed in the history of the foundation. This outpouring enabled the foundation to respond with the necessary humanitarian resources and meet the needs of the vulnerable victims whose lives have become unimaginably unbearable.

The foundation's work directly improved the lives of more than 500,000 people through our programs in education, health, social services, economic development and other programs. Over \$6,000,000 in the year 2000 was earmarked and distributed for helping families and communities, thanks to our generous and committed supporters.

The following pages highlight our work for the year 2000.

Despite many challenges faced by the Palestinian people, our work remains focused on long-term initiatives that improve various issues affecting their daily lives. Our orphan, student, and needy family sponsorship programs assisted hundreds of people struggling to survive devastating realities by providing the means to mobilize resources that help reverse devastating trends that all too often affect impoverished children and families.

Orphan Sponsorship

For the year 2000, 1,920 orphans were sponsored -- a 26% increase from 1999. To date, this is one of the most memorable years for the orphaned children of the Holy Land. A nominal monthly donation of \$55 insured children attended school and participated in social activities in addition to receiving the basic essentials such as food, clothing, medical care, shelter, and in many instances psychological counseling. Through this program, the foundation is laying the groundwork for productive members of society by enabling these special children to develop their full potential in an environment plagued with scarcity.

Needy Families

The foundation identifies family as the valuable nucleus of society. Through our family sponsorship program, economic assistance provided a means for the beginning of self-sufficiency to over 312 families in the year 2000 -- a 25% increase from 1999. Many of these families experience excessive hardships simply due to geographic location and the lack of employment in their regions. As the year 2000 came to an end, and as more lives were affected, more and more families joined our rosters of the needy. Our field workers continue to identify the need, and our donors continue to fulfill them.

Omar Bin al-Khatib Orphanage

The foundation provided the funding for two floors in the construction of a new orphanage in Bethlehem. The orphanage will house, feed, and clothe orphans between the ages of one day to ten years old, at which time they will be moved to another facility for older children. The two floors are dedicated to the foundation, bearing a plaque in recognition of our \$150,000 donation. The children will learn social skills, have academic counseling, tutors, and social activities to help them become productive members of society.

The Holy Land Foundation for Relief and Development remains committed to improving the health care needs of families throughout Jordan, Lebanon, and Palestine. Working in concert with dedicated associations of health professionals, the foundation is increasing the skills and capacities of local health care providers. In the year 2000, the foundation conducted numerous health fairs, instituted clinics, facilitated working visits of specialized physicians and distributed medicines in addition to our ongoing health related projects.

Annual highlights

As we reported in May 2000, the foundation implemented a dental facility and an ultra sound machine at the Khalid Bin al-Walid Clinic in Ein Hilwey Camp, Lebanon. Over 80,000 refugees live in this camp, making it the second largest Palestinian refugee camp in the world. These refugees rely on the medical services provided by this facility, which served over 500 people within the first six months. The dental facility provides re-constructive and cosmetic procedures as well as routine maintenance and care.

Medical Center Lebanon

Over 5,000 refugees were in dire need of reachable medical facilities in the Al Jaleel Camp in Lebanon. To address these needs, an exciting new clinic was constructed with full service medical care. This clinic provides 24-hour emergency care, OB/GYN facilities, x-ray and ultra sound resources, dermatology, and a full service laboratory.

Wheelchairs for Gaza

The Holy Land Foundation for Relief and Development, in partnership with Wheelchair Foundation, Hope Haven International, and Airline Ambassadors, brought the gift of mobility to the disabled in Gaza. Seven hundred and twenty new wheelchairs were distributed to men, women, and children throughout Gaza. For some of these disabled, it was the first wheelchair they had ever owned. The success of the mission was aided by a group of ten physiotherapists and occupational therapists from the U.S. who volunteered to travel with foundation staff to ensure each recipient was fitted properly in their new chair.

Education, one of the keys to development for any society, is a fundamental tool the Holy Land Foundation for Relief and Development utilizes to help build a foundation for a strong future. Education is crucial to ensure that every girl and boy receives a good quality primary education and that every adolescent must be afforded ample opportunity to develop individually and to participate beneficially in society.

The foundation is seeing substantial progress in children and their families since our educational programs were established. The financial burdens of these needy families are eased through programs that provide for tuition, books, uniforms, shoes, supplies, and stipends for the students that help their family satisfy their monthly needs. These programs are vital to ensure that these children do not have to exchange their education for menial employment just to help feed their families in financially difficult situations.

Student Sponsorship

As the year came to an end, many children in Palestine were unable to attend school due mostly to closures and lack of funds. The Student Sponsorship program is designed to address this situation. Our efforts keep the yearning for education alive and ensure the safe and stable environment required for learning. The year 2000 witnessed an increase of 23% in our Student Sponsorship program, with 334 students receiving sponsored education.


Al-Isra'a Kindergarten

Guaranteeing that children have the necessary facilities and materials to receive an education is half the mission; getting the children there is the other half. This was the problem at West Bank's Al-Isra'a Kindergarten, which was in desperate need of a bus for transporting children to and from school. Many children were missing school from the lack of transportation, causing some to completely forgo attending school. The foundation purchased a school bus for the kindergarten that enables the school to pick up children in the camps and elsewhere, ensuring that students never have to miss a single day due to transportation concerns again.

Computer Labs for Turkey


One year after the devastating earthquake rocked Turkey in August of 1999, the foundation continued its humanitarian mission by installing three computer labs in two of the hardest hit cities. The severe destruction left many of the vulnerable and under-served students without the necessary tools to continue their studies and contribute to building a sustainable future. Each of the 28 computers installed are identified by a commemorative inscription, *A Gift from the Holy Land Foundation*, to let the students know that the foundation's donors are continuously committed to humanity.

Holy Land Foundation for Relief and Development implements programs that are community driven and sustainable. Programs that earn priority status with the foundation are those aimed at rebuilding infrastructure and opening employment opportunities. Such programs provide a basis for self-sufficiency and benefits that will last long after the foundation's role is done.

In the West Bank

The village of Al-Mizrah Al-Sharkia, situated just outside of the West Bank town of Ramallah, had no paved roads to provide unimpeded transit to and from the city. After a study was conducted, the foundation provided the necessary funding, totaling \$47,000, to open new roads that connect the village with the city and significantly reduce travel time between them. The tremendous benefits of this project include commercial movement, normally stifled in rigid conditions, which is providing opportunities to numerous village residents.

In Lebanon

The foundation is funding and implementing an income-generating project for women. Every day, thirty women from the camps attend continuing education classes to learn sewing and embroidery. The delicate hand stitched items are purchased by the foundation and sold to our donor population. A variety of items, from pillow covers to eyeglass cases, are distributed across America.

Also, in Sidon, Lebanon, the foundation is happy to report its supermarket provides low-cost quality items to the needy and the general camp population. The Al-Yesor Supermarket offers fresh breads, dairy, dry goods, as well as numerous household essentials at a nominal cost to the consumer. The availability of these goods at such low costs services over 100,000 needy refugees. Many families from nearby Ein Hilwey camp visit the store to receive the best prices available for the merchandise purchased. The store, which is run by residents of the refugee camp, is self-sustaining and provides income that would otherwise not be available.

The two Muslim holidays, Eid al-Fitr and Eid al-Adha, are a times of joy and the foundation plays an important role during these times through the Eid Gift program.



Our seasonal projects continue to be on of our most extensive charitable divisions. During the month of Ramadan and Adha, our worldwide staff ensures that families do not go hungry and are able to participate in the spirit of the holidays.

Ramadan

This is the Muslim holy month of fasting and caring for the less fortunate takes center stage. In Ramadan 2000, our donors fed and clothed over 248,000 people through their Zakat, the required charity in Islam, totaling more than \$1 million -- a remarkable 56% increase from the previous year. In addition to our food package program, our offices in Jordan, Lebanon, and Palestine hosted iftars, communal breaking of the daily fast, for over 8500 needy individuals throughout the month. Our efforts were essential to reaching those who would have gone without during this holy time.

Eid al-Adha

The festival commemorating Prophet Ibrahim's willingness to sacrifice his son for God is a very sacred time for Muslims. The foundation helps fulfill one of the great rituals of this celebration for our donors through animal sacrifice and meat distribution to the needy wherever directed. Again, the outpouring for the year 2000 was overwhelming with a 37% increase from 1999 that was distributed to over 24,000 families in Jordan, Lebanon, and Palestine. In the countries of Bosnia, Iraq, Somalia, Chechnya, and India, the foundation distributed meat and food packages to over 3000 families.

Eid Gifts

In addition to distribution of meat, many of the impoverished families received Eid gifts that included stoves, refrigerators, and repairs to their homes. Many children received gifts of new clothing, shoes, toys, and candy that sparked the spirit of the holiday.

As is noted, the year 2000 was our most successful year to date, and we continue to grow each year with the generosity of our donors.

Working at home, the Holy Land Foundation for Relief and Development continues to operate its food pantry in Patterson, New Jersey, serving a diverse community of needy individuals. After the initial opening in February 1999, the Holy Land Foundation Food Pantry served the needs of seven families. One year later, the Pantry served 115 families who include 171 adults and 216 children.

Our office staff works daily to receive the necessary donations used to stock the pantry with food and clothes the needy can shop without cost. Recognition throughout the community brought praise and ongoing grants for the pantry from various private donors and local organizations. Unfortunately, the demand continues to grow, but our staff is continuing to meet the need.

Fort Worth

As is customary when tragedy strikes close to home, the foundation responds. In March of 2000, a devastating tornado ripped through Fort Worth, Texas, leaving a path of destruction. The foundation responded through a \$10,000 donation to the City Council for distribution to those most in need.

Volunteer Services

The foundation makes every effort to partner with national and local organizations to work towards empowering our communities in the areas of education, community services, volunteerism, interfaith and racial dialogues. Members of the foundation travel regularly across the continent to conduct or participate in workshops, forums, and seminars that focus on social and human betterment.

The Holy Land Foundation for Relief and Development assisted American Islamic organizations with their fundraising efforts as part of the foundation's growing volunteer service programs. Approximately two million dollars were raised with foundation staff assisting through logistical, management, and fundraising technique consulting. All funds raised with the help of Holy Land Foundation advisors went directly to the organizations, which included Islamic centers, mosques and schools in various cities throughout the country.

In Chechnya, where fighting continued forcing hundreds of thousands of Chechens to flee, the Holy Land Foundation for Relief and Development, in partnership with United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), provided food and hygiene products to the mostly women and children refugee population who were displaced by the conflict. Part of the relief effort was delegating over \$146,000 to feed Chechens in the Pankisi Valley.

Mozambique

When severe flooding hit Mozambique, the foundation contacted the United Nations World Food Program (UNWFP), a foundation partner in previous humanitarian efforts who was working in the region, and donated \$15,000 that was used to help with their massive food distribution.

Lebanon

After three power plants were bombed in Lebanon, leaving a very large segment of the population in the dark, the foundation started a campaign to raise over \$100,000 for reconstruction efforts. Once the efforts were finished, the bombing victims' lives were re-illuminated with new electric power.

Turkey

In Turkey, the foundation was able to feed 66,000 victims of the second catastrophic earthquake in the city of Duzce throughout the month of Ramadan. Both the government and the people of Turkey expressed their sincerest gratitude to the foundation and our donors.

Palestine

As the year came to a close, people of conscious throughout the globe were gripped by haunting scenes coming out of Palestine. The foundation worked tirelessly to meet the needs of the victims by working in unison with other groups to address this tremendous humanitarian emergency. Over one million dollars went towards the relief efforts, which included purchasing ambulances, distributing food, and providing medical and financial assistance. As this report goes to print, the crisis is continuing to escalate and our offices continue to be on the ground providing humanitarian assistance on behalf of our generous donors.

We have audited the accompanying statement of financial position of the Holy Land Foundation as of December 31, 2000, and the related statements of activities, cash flows, and expenses by natural classification for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Foundation's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation.
