

Instructions for Petit Jurors

Welcome to federal jury service for the United States District Court, Northern District of Texas. You are here because you have received a FEDERAL SUMMONS to report to the District Court, Abilene Division at the Federal Building U.S. Post Office and Courthouse. If your summons is **not** a federal summons please see the Jury Clerk.

Jury Selection - Your name was taken from the voter registration list or the licensed driver list in your county. Subsequently, you were mailed a qualification questionnaire form to complete and return to the Court. After the Court determined that you were qualified to serve, you were summoned to serve a term of approximately two weeks. After you have completed the term, it is unlikely that you will be called again for a period of two years unless, by coincidence, your name is drawn again from either the voter registration list or the licensed driver list.

The U.S. District Court, Northern District of Texas, is comprised of seven divisions including: Abilene, Amarillo, Dallas, Fort Worth, Lubbock, San Angelo, and Wichita Falls. The Abilene division encompasses thirteen counties: Callahan, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Howard, Jones, Mitchell, Nolan, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Taylor, and Throckmorton.

Jury Service - Your term of service begins the day you are instructed to begin calling the recorded message and continues for approximately two weeks, unless otherwise instructed by a Judge or the recorded message. The term of service is for the entire two weeks and it is possible to be selected to serve on more than one trial. All jurors are required to call the recorded message daily. You can call the recorded message any time after 3:00 p.m. The toll-free number is **1-800-488-0903**. The number may be busy so keep trying as often as necessary to receive your instructions. If you are calling the Jury Office for other information dial **(325)677-6311 or (888)548-4730**.

Reporting for Service - Jury service may require early attendance in our Court and it is *critical* that you report on time. Most of our trials last between 1 and 3 days; however, on occasion, a trial may last longer. The Judges typically open court each morning at 9:00 a.m. and adjourn for the evening between 5:00 p.m. and 5:30 p.m. Each Judge will release his/her jury each evening and will tell you exactly what time you must return the following morning.

No juror will be released until all the Judges have selected their juries, so allow a full day for jury service. If you report for jury service for the purpose of being excused (e.g. doctor / dentist appointments, essential business meetings, out-of-town travel, training, care of a minor, etc.), you will not be paid. If you have reported for jury service as requested and you are not selected to serve, you are still required to call the recorded message every day between 3:00 p.m. and the following morning for further instructions. The recording is updated every day by 3:00 p.m.

"Any person who fails to show good cause for noncompliance with a summons may be fined not more than \$1,000, imprisoned not more than three days, ordered to perform community service, or any combination thereof." 28 U.S.C. § 1866(g)

Payment - You are paid a \$40.00 attendance fee for each day you report for your assigned jury duty, whether or not you are actually selected to serve. Government employees will not be paid the \$40.00 attendance fee. Regardless of the mode of transportation, you will receive \$0.54 mileage compensation round trip from your home to the Federal Building U.S. Post Office and Courthouse.

The \$40.00 attendance fee must be reported as income for tax purposes. The Jury Section will provide you with a Form 1099 if your attendance fee exceeds \$600.00. You must keep a record of the amount you receive as no tax has been withheld and no W-2 forms are provided. However, you do not need to report travel and parking reimbursements as income.

Change of Address, Telephone Number or Place of Employment - Jurors who have a change of address, phone number, or place of employment should submit their changes to the Jury Clerk as soon as possible. A current address is important for receiving your jury fee check (the Post Office will not forward checks). It is also important to keep a current phone number on file with the Jury Clerk so you may be contacted in the event the case settles, or there are problems with the recorded message.

Attendance Certificates - The Jury Clerk will give you an attendance certificate showing the dates and length of time you served. You may need this certificate as proof of attendance for your employer or for your own records.

Protection of Jurors' Employment - In accordance with Title 28, United States Code, Section 1875, no employer shall discharge, threaten to discharge, intimidate, or coerce any permanent employee by reason of such employee's jury service, or the attendance or scheduled attendance in connection with such service, in any court of the United States.

Other Helpful Information -

- * All jurors must wear appropriate business attire for jury duty. Jeans are permitted. Shorts and T-shirts are not considered appropriate attire.
- * Vending machines are located in the basement of the federal courthouse building. Take the south elevator (by men's restroom) and exit to the right once you reach the basement.
- * Restrooms are available on the 2nd floor, including one for wheelchair access. The ladies' restroom is to the right as you exit the courtroom.
- * Food, beverages, and chewing gum are **NOT** permitted in the Courtroom.
- * Cameras, recording equipment, laptop computers, radios, TV's, cellular phones, or any other electronic equipment is **NOT** permitted in the courtroom..
- * Guns, pepper spray and sharp objects are **NOT** permitted in the federal building.
